#### WHAT WE DO

Global Ties Iowa coordinates people-to-people exchanges between international leaders and residents of eastern Iowa.

As a member of Global Ties U.S., we collaborate with the U.S. Department of State's sponsored exchange programs, including International Visitor Leadership Program (IVLP), to host current and emerging international leaders who work in both public and private sectors. By programming meetings and exchange opportunities between visiting leaders and their professional peers, hosting lowa Table Dinners, and sharing unique aspects of the eastern lowa community, Global Ties lowa connects the world and the heartland.

We seek to strengthen our community's commitment to and participation in international exchanges on professional and individual levels. We believe in the inherent value of these interactions and that people-to-people exchanges contribute to the creation of a more prosperous local community



## TREASURER'S REPORT


Looking back on FY22, Global Ties Iowa remained in a stable financial situation. The organization's core funding continues to be the Community Partnership Grant (CPG) funded through the U.S. State Department. CPG funding levels increase or decrease based on the number of programs and visitors Global Ties Iowa hosts during a given year. During the pandemic years, the State Department froze funding levels, but are now transitioning back to the historical funding structure based on visitors and programs. Knowing such, the board and staff prioritized increasing the organization's program and visitor capacity, as seen above, resulting in a noticeable increase of CPG funds. It must be said to all volunteers and staff: thank you for all your efforts! Your effort truly materialized and grew Global Ties Iowa this year.


One significant financial change this year was shifting the Executive Director to a salaried part-time position, which was made possible by greater CPG funding. The board recognized that Global Ties Iowa's sustainability and growth depended greatly on staff, and thus continued investment in personnel will be necessary for long-term sustainability and growth plans. Another noticeable financial change was a decrease in year-over-year expenses, due primarily to a lack of technology spending that was used in the previous fiscal year to support virtual programming. Lastly, a fiscal highlight that should not be ignored: membership and donations increased by almost 50% compared to FY21. An increase, no doubt, connected to Global Ties Iowa's growing momentum within eastern lowa built on the passion each staff, member, and contributor gave to fostering international cooperation and understanding this year— Global Ties lowa's mission.


